
We show you how to choose a pediatrician, or, the doctor you and your kid may see for the next 18 YEARS

How to choose a pediatrician

- Decide what type of doctor you want, start your search early. Your child's primary caregiver may be an MD, Nurse Practitioner, or Physician's Assistant
- Where to start the search? Ask friends, your primary care doctor, or Google to see who is highly rated in your area
- Table Stakes:
 - Board-certified (your doctor has decided to complete additional qualifications and ongoing education programs). These can be FAAP or ABP
 - Does the doctor take your insurance?
 - Proximity to your home. (You'll have a lot of appointments)
 - Logistics. Accepting new patients? Office hours? Saturdays?
 - Can you interview them? During the interview, are they giving you their time and attention? Are they making you feel like your questions are dumb, or don't matter? Make sure your personalities are a match
 - Would your pediatrician have hospital privileges at your birth hospital? (nice, not necessary)

Logistics

If your partner goes into labor when you're not there, what's the plan? How will she reach you? If labor comes early, will we stick with our chosen delivery location, or have a backup option that focuses on premature birth? When labor begins, should we call the OB's office, or go directly to the hospital? Where's the hospital entrance? Where do you park? What's the quickest route to get there? Can you fill out pre-admission paperwork? Name, address and phone number of your hospital on the fridge? Plans for hospital transportation? Who will take your partner to the hospital in the event you're unavailable? Phone number for an ambulance service (in case of emergency) Plan for care for other kids or pets? Cook and freeze some go-to meals?

Communications & vistors plan

Who do you want to be there for the actual birth? (Most couples choose just the two of you)
 What's the plan for visitors? Who will come, in what order?
 It's perfectly ok to want to enjoy your new family on your own before welcoming a deluge of admirers
 What's the plan for communicating updates to the world?
 What pictures are you guys ok sharing or not sharing in all of this communication? Via what channels?

Pre-pack a bag a week or so ahead of time


